

2019 School Budget Vote Exit Survey Report

PRODUCED IN COOPERATION WITH THE CAPITAL REGION BOCES COMMUNICATIONS SERVICE, JUNE 2019

Introduction

The Fayetteville-Manlius Central School District conducted an exit survey during its annual school budget vote on May 21, 2019. The purpose was to collect demographic data about who voted on the budget and information about why voters voted the way they did.

The survey was voluntary and anonymous. Surveys were made available electronically to voters at the polling site for anyone who chose to fill one out after voting. While these results do not represent the opinions of all voters, they do provide many residents' perceptions about the district and its proposed budget.


The following data were compiled by the Capital Region BOCES Communications Service in cooperation with the BOCES public information specialists assigned to F-M, Nancy Cole and Kristine Jarosz.

Please note: Percentages, where provided, are out of the number of survey participants who responded to that particular question, and not out of the total number of survey participants. For some questions, total percentages may add up to more than 100% because participants were able to select more than one answer choice or as a result of rounding percentages to the nearest whole number.

Fayetteville-Manlius voter turnout and survey participation

In 2019, 1,213 residents voted on Fayetteville-Manlius' school budget. This is 437 fewer residents than voted in 2018, a decrease of 26%. [*See chart below.*]

Of the 1,213 residents who voted in person, 481 chose to fill out an exit survey, a response rate of 40%. This response rate is 2 percentage points lower than last year, and 16 percentage points higher than the previous year's. [*See chart below.*]



In 2019, 40% of voters filled out an exit survey, compared to 42% in 2018 and 26% in 2017. 100%

Voters by age group

The chart at right classifies voters by age group, as indicated by exit survey data. The 2019 distribution is similar to that of the past two years, but the number of respondents ages 51 and older has increased by 2 percentage points to 50 percent, and the number of respondents ages 31-50 has decreased by 3%.

Typical voting habits

In 2019, more than 76% of survey respondents said they typically vote "yes" on the budget, while close to 6% said they typically vote "no." More than 13% said their vote varies, and nearly 5% said they have not voted in the past. This is similar to the survey data from 2017 and 2018.

How did F-M residents vote?

Of those who completed a survey in 2019, 7 participants did not indicate how they voted on the budget. Of those that did, 391 said they voted "yes" on the budget, while 83 said they voted "no." This represents a margin of 82% in favor and 18% opposed.

The actual approval rate of the budget was 74%—a difference of 8 percentage points—meaning that a higher percentage of "yes" voters filled out an exit survey than did "no" voters.

In our experience, this is not uncommon with school budget vote exit surveys. In F-M, the same trend has been evident since 2013, with a similar margin of difference between the exit survey and actual approval rates in prior years. The chart to the right illustrates this trend with data from the last three years.



Survey respondents were asked to "select ALL that apply" from a list of options regarding parental status. Below is the percentage of responders for each category:

Budget approval rates were highest among current parents who indicated they have children at specific middle or elementary schools, and lowest among parents whose children are of school-age but do not attend F-M schools. These approval rates are similar to those of the previous year

Budget approval rates among different voter categories


Among the survey respondents, a majority approved the budget in 2019 regardless of age. The highest approval rate, 92%, was among those ages 18-19, up from 84% in 2018; 87% of respondents ages 65 and older approved the budget; and 86% of those ages 31-50 and 77% of those ages 51-64 votes "yes" on the budget. The lowest approval rate, 71%, was among those ages 20-30.

This year, 96% of respondents who said they typically vote "yes" did so again in 2019, while 89% of those who said they typically vote "no" voted against the budget. Nearly 87% of those who said they were voting for the first time voted in favor of the budget. Slightly more than one-third (35%) of those who said their vote varies approved the budget proposal this year. The highest approval rate, 92%, was among those ages 18-19.

Why do voters vote the way they do?

On the exit survey, participants could choose from a list of reasons for why they voted the way they did on the proposed school budget. The list was not restricted — in other words, "no" voters could select answer choices one would expect to correlate with a "yes" vote, and vice versa.

The following are the reasons given by respondents — "yes" voters and "no" voters — for voting the way they did, in both chart and table form:

From this data, one can draw a few conclusions; namely, that:

- The projected spending and tax increases were the most significant factor that respondents gave for their "no" vote, but the projected tax increase was cited by more respondents than the spending increase. (This year is the first that these two factors were separated; previous surveys grouped "spending/tax increase" as one option.)
- The quality of the schools remains important to Fayetteville-Manlius voters, as 80% of respondents indicated that their satisfaction with the quality of the schools motivated their vote an increase of 7 percentage points over the previous year. That number increases to 92% when looking at "yes" voters.
- The number of exit survey respondents who indicated confidence in the school board and administration has increased over the previous year by 9 percentage points overall for the school board, and by 7 percentage points overall for the administration. Fewer "no" voters cited a lack of confidence in the school board and administration as motivating factors for their vote compared to the previous year.

What were voters' best sources of information about the budget?

Overall, 90% of survey participants said they had enough information on the proposed budget. The approval rate among responders who indicated they had enough information on the proposed budget was 86% (up from 82% in 2018). The approval rate for respondents who said they did not receive enough information was 54% (down from 58% in 2018).

Survey respondents indicated that district publications were their best source of budget information (83%). Compared with the previous year, the district website (26%) and budget forums and presentations (18%) have shown an increase as a best sources of budget information for 2019, while district email (SNN) went down by 10 percentage points.

Regardless of where respondents got their budget information, a majority of survey respondents approved the budget. The highest approval rates were among those who cited Home andSchool Association (96%) as their best sources of information. The second-highest approval rate was among respondents who cited budget forums and presentations — a category that increased by 9 percentage points from the previous year.

The lowest approval rate was among those who cited local news media (78%) as their best source of information.

The survey language differed slightly this year, identifying "social media (Twitter, Facebook)" as an option, while last year's survey had specified "District social media." Therefore, there may not be a direct relationship between year-to-year results in that specific category.

District publications have steadily grown to be the clear best source of budget information cited by survey respondents.

Non-mandated areas to preserve in case of budget cuts

For several years, Fayetteville-Manlius has asked survey participants to identify no more than 3 non-mandated areas from a list of 11 that they would most like to see preserved if the district has to make budget cuts in the future.

As in years past, the top 2 non-mandated programs survey participants said they want to see preserved are class sizes and college-level courses. One change to note in 2019 was an increase of 8 percentage points for preserving elective course offerings in grades 9-12.

Who were the "yes" voters in Fayetteville-Manlius?

In 2019, of those survey respondents who said they voted "yes" on the budget:

- 45% said they are between the ages of 31 and 50 years; 94% said they are at least 31 years old.
- 88% gave the quality of education provided by Fayetteville-Manlius a rating of "excellent"; 11% rated it "good."
- 88% said they typically vote "yes" on the budget; fewer than 1% said they typically vote "no." Six percent said their vote varies, and 5% said they have not voted in the past.
- 94% said they had enough information on the proposed budget.
- 83% said district publications were their best source of budget information, 26% said district website, and 23% said district email.
- 46% said class size was an area they would most like to see preserved, followed by college-level courses (37%) and elective offerings for grades 9-12 (34%).
- 42% said they had a child past high school age. 36% are parents of F-M students.
- 53% preferred Fayetteville Elementary as the voting location.

Who were the "no" voters in Fayetteville-Manlius?

In 2019, of those survey respondents who said they voted "no" on the budget:

- 38% said they are between the ages of 31 and 50 years; 92% said they were at least 31 years or older.
- 67% gave the quality of education provided by Fayetteville-Manlius a rating of "excellent"; 24% gave it a rating of "good."
- 29% said they typically vote "no" on the budget; 18% said they typically vote "yes." 49% said their vote varies, and nearly 4% said they have not voted in the past.
- 74% said they had enough information on the proposed budget.
- 83% said district publications were their best source of budget information; 28% said the district website; and an equal number of respondents (19%) cited local media and friends and acquaintances.
- 37% said elective course offerings for grades 9-12 was an area they would most like to see preserved, followed by college-level courses (36%) and class sizes (31%).
- Nearly 33% said they had a child past high school age; 38% said they were parents of F-M students.
- 46% preferred Fayetteville Elementary as the voting location.

Since the parental status categories of the survey are not exclusive (i.e., a parent may have children at more than one school location), the number of F-M parents was calculated by subtracting all other categories from the total number of respondents.

F-M voters and polling locations

In 2019, residents were asked where they would prefer to vote if the district is able to move polling places for future votes.

Of those that responded, 52% of respondents said that, if the district is able to move the polling place for future votes, they would prefer to keep it to Fayetteville Elementary School.

Among respondents, parents of Wellwood Middle School students had the strongest preference for Fayetteville Elementary as a polling location (72%). Parents of Enders Road students had the lowest preference for that polling site (10%).

Equal numbers of respondents (nearly 24%) preferred Eagle Hill Middle School and the Village of Manlius Offices. Among respondents, parents of Enders Road students had the strongest preference for Eagle Hill as a polling location (58%). Parents of Mott Road students had the lowest preference for Eagle Hill as a polling site (3%).

Parents of Eagle Hill students had the strongest preference for the Village of Manlius Offices as a polling location (35%). Parents who attend school outside the F-M system had the lowest preference for the Village Offices as a polling site, with none of those respondents selecting that polling location.

Rating an F-M education

More than 84% of respondents said the quality of education provided by Fayetteville-Manlius was excellent in 2019. This is a 7 percentage point increase from 2018 and a 10 percentage point increase over 2017.

In 2019, 13% of survey participants gave F-M a "good" rating and 1% gave the school district a "fair" rating. Two respondents (less than 1%) indicated they

felt the quality of education at Fayetteville-Manlius was poor, and about 1% indicated they did not now how they would rate the education provided by F-M.


About 86% of respondents who rated F-M as "excellent" also approved the budget proposal. This is similar to the previous year. As the opinion of the district's educational program decreased among respondents, the budget approval rate also decreased, with about 67% of respondents who rated F-M as "good" approving the budget, and about 20% of respondents who rated F-M as "fair" approving the budget.

The two respondents who rated the quality of education from the district as poor did not approve the budget. Among the five respondents who indicated they didn't know how to rate the quality of education at F-M, four voted "yes" and one voted "no."



Q1 How did you vote on the proposed 2019-20 school budget?





Q2 Why did you vote the way you did on the proposed school budget? (Please select all that apply.)





Q3 How have you typically voted on the school budget in the past?





Q4 Did you have enough information on the proposed budget?






Q6 If the district has to make cuts, which three of the following nonmandated areas would you most like to see PRESERVED? (Please select your top three only.)



Q7 If the district is able to move the polling place for future votes, which location would you prefer? (Select one)



Q8 In general, how would you grade the quality of education provided by Fayetteville-Manlius?





Cross-Tabulation: How respondents voted (yes/no) cross-tabulated with each question


Of those who voted "yes" or "no," what percentage fell into each voter category?






